Why study Geography?

Course Requirements

To succeed in Geography, you will need to have an interest in the natural environment and a concern over inequalities among people. Good reading, writing and numeracy skills will also help you to achieve in the subject. During the course, you will develop your understanding of world issues and unfamiliar challenges faced by the natural and human world. Being open to debate and discussion, as well as engaging with the news to hear the latest updates as they develop, will help you to get the most out of the subject. The broad nature of the subject means there may be some topics that you are less interested in initially, but applying a growth mindset and persevering usually changes this outlook. That in itself, is a fantastic life skill!

PAPER 1: Physical Geography - 1hr 30mins - 35%

Physical Landscapes in the UK - Rivers and Coasts

The Living World - Tropical Rainforests and Cold Environments

Natural Hazards - Volcanoes, Earthquakes, Tropical Storms and Climate Change

PAPER 2: Human Geography – 1hr 30mins – 35%

Urban Issues and Challenges – Sustainable Urban Living, Rio de Janeiro (Brazil) and London (UK)

Resource Management - Food, Water and Energy

The Changing Economic World - The Development Gap, Nigeria, The UK Economy

PAPER 3: Geographical Applications - 1hr 15mins - 30%

Issue Evaluation - debating a geographical issue

Fieldwork – this includes a compulsory day trip to Skegness for pupils to carry out investigations on the beach and in the town which they will be questioned on in the exam

Exam questions range from multiple-choice questions, to extended written questions up to a maximum of 9 marks.

Marks are awarded in the exam for your knowledge and understanding of the subject, as well as your ability to evaluate issues from different points of view. In addition, the exams include maths, graph and map skills questions, presenting unfamiliar scenarios for you to interpret and analyse.
