Enriching experiences to develop the whole person

At Amherst, we firmly believe that education extends beyond the classroom, encompassing holistic development of a child's social, emotional, physical, spiritual and intellectual attributes.

We offer a diverse range of co-curricular opportunities, enabling our pupils to enhance their academic enrichment and interests. These include Young Medics, Philosophy Society, Debating and STEM Crest Award, all of which have dedicated time slots in our timetable. Throughout the academic year, pupils have numerous opportunities for enriching experiences such as educational visits, cultural exchanges, engaging talks, conferences and team-building sessions. These activities are designed to expand pupils' academic interests beyond the classroom







Our dedicated form tutors diligently monitor each pupil's cocurricular involvement, ensuring a well-rounded portfolio of activities tailored to their interests. This deliberate approach lays the foundation for our students to craft compelling personal statement for UCAS and other pursuits beyond Sixth Form, such as applying for degree apprenticeships or international universities. The co-curriculum is an integral component of our educational framework at Amherst, complementing our academic curriculum and personal development programme.

Our co-curricular activities are categorised into four enriching domains: Leadership, Creativity, Wellbeing & Exercise, and Community. These endeavours empower our pupils to develop crucial skills such as leadership, resilience, teamwork, and an appreciation for wellbeing, attributes that hold immense value not only during their time at school but also in their future endeavours.





Many of our co-curricular activities integrate into the school day during our extended lunchtime. These clubs and activities, whether conducted before, during break, lunchtime, or after school, all share the common goal of enriching the individual.

We encourage pupils to explore their passions and interests actively, recognising that discovering what does not resonate with them is equally valuable as finding new passions. The Sister Celine Award ensures that all pupils benefit from a well-rounded education, equipping them to grow into individuals of character.

Pupils can achieve this award by experiencing breadth or depth in co-curricular activities.

Amherst also provides opportunities for Years 9-12 to work towards The Duke of Edinburgh's Award and, in the Sixth Form, to engage in the Combined Cadet Force.

## Preparatory School Co-Curricular

Pupils in the Preparatory School participate in the Sister Celine Award in the same way as in the Senior School. Clubs offered in the Preparatory School range from chess club to prayer journalling, book club, sports skills, puzzle club and gardening club

From Year 3 and beyond, pupils have expanded access to afterschool sports programmes as they settle into their new year group. This adjustment is based on our experience, which has shown that such provision increases stamina and helps children maintain focus during lessons.

## Sixth Form Enrichment

Our Sixth Form students benefit from a comprehensive enrichment programme during Thursday afternoons, granting them access to a wide range of activities offered across the Loughborough Schools Foundation.

Our Sixth Formers actively contribute to various aspects of school life, from running their own Sixth Form Committee to House Leadership, mentoring younger peers, organising clubs and societies, engaging in community and charitable initiatives, participating in the Combined Cadet Force, and excelling in Music, Drama, and Sports.

Moreover, our Sixth Form experience is enriched by a full calendar of events, including balls, dinners, tours, trips and our guest speaker programme. Many of these events are organised in collaboration with Loughborough High School and Loughborough Grammar School, further enhancing the richness of Sixth Form life on campus.


